Dear Friends

How do you hear God's voice? Jesus said: 'My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me.' (Jn 10:27). One of the ways in which God has spoken is through Scripture. Most importantly, we have the words of Jesus, which we can find in the Gospels. So, for example, how do you discover what God thinks about how we should relate to other people?

Someone asked Jesus, out of all the thousands of commands in the Old Testament, which are the most important ones? Jesus replied: 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets.' (Mt 22:37-28). In these few simple

words, Jesus is telling us that the way we express our love for God is by loving the people with whom we have contact, who are made in God's image. (In case there is any doubt about this, every human being on the face of the planet is made in the image of God).

In these incredibly simple words, where Jesus quotes the Old Testament and summarises all of scripture, we hear God's voice telling us that to worship God is to love people. We may not always agree with other people, but we are always called to love them. The way we love other people is to think about how we would like to be treated, and to treat other people in that way.

Sometimes we get hung up on how many hymns we sing, or what colour the candles are, or if we have candles or not. It's fine to have personal preferences about all of these things, yet ultimately none of those things really matters as much as how loving and kind we are to the people we encounter. So, hearing God's voice helps us to separate the trivial things in life from the big strategic things that really matter. We hear God's voice in the words of Jesus, which tell us how to live out our love for God by loving the people he has made.





The Faithfulness of God through the seasons

Greetings to you from Chiang Mai, Thailand. This newsletter comes after a period of extra busyness, disease spread, extra opportunities for learning from visitors and trainings and opportunities to celebrate our mother figures at this special time in Thailand. In the midst of all this, the good and the challenging, the overall surely has been that God has and is with us through this, and His love and faithfulness never fails.

At the Social Development Services Unit of the Church of Christ In Thailand the opportunity to begin an extensive project helping vulnerable people in a large rural community has taken fruit. The SDSU team and the newly appointed project manager for this particular project successfully completed essential surveys and assessments, with the help of local volunteers and church support. With this thorough baseline information many families will now be guided and supported in sustainable development activities, income generation trainings and over a 3 year period will, God willing, be in a much more secure place both economically, environmentally, socially and spiritually. It is a privilege for the SDSU staff to learn alongside a well established development organisation, and learn new ways to help communities grow, develop and become more sustainable. We are confident that the new ideas and skills we are learning through this, will transform the other areas of current and future work, so that many more people will benefit and above all, that many more people served through SDSU will recognise the faithfulness of God, who loves them dearly and yearns for them to reach the fulness of life in Him.

At Hope Home it has been a time of ups and downs laughter and tears, but through it all too God's faithfulness and protection has been real and evident to our non believing staff. Firstly we were delighted to be able to access the right for all staff and children to have their influenza vaccines. We trust this will help avert the severity of these sorts of illnesses as the seasons change from hot to wet and then hot and wet, and our children, many with underlying medical conditions, are veryvulnerable. This all went well and we appreciate the understanding and flexibility of the nurse clinic there to

have us all turn up over a couple of days. However, unlike other years, and my first time dealing with this in over 20 years in Thailand, we became a dengue fever cluster over a period of 4 weeks. This is a mosquito-borne disease, and can be very severe and serious, or be completely manageable at home. We have had nearly all the children sick, and several staff members too. Praise God all are now on the road to recovery, three spent time in hospital including intensive care, and the rest we kept and treated from home. We are very aware how much God has protected our most vulnerable children and praise Him for this. At this time we had two new staff members start their training with us and bless them they have managed very well with all our routines completely overturned by dealing with this sickness. Pray that the recovery for all continues, and full strength and health will be restored in His timing.



Into this mix of health crisis, we at Hope Home have also been blessed with the opportunity to learn from visitors passing through. A team of professors and students of Physical Therapy came and did a great consult on each child and helped us move them forwards with new or differing exercises. Their visit coincided with a visit from students and professors versed in alternative communication methods, essential for our non verbal children, and they too blessed us with new ideas, and updates on systems in use. Also at this time too two of our children and staff attended a 5 day intensive training in a new therapy technique from Japan and we are keen to learn how to adapt to all the children here. So in a busy period, there has been blessing, opportunity and challenges but through it all we have seen God at work, opening doors of opportunity and keeping us all safe. The non Christian staff here are overwhelmed with the way complete strangers are so willing to come and help, and teach their skills, and to do it in an attitude of Christian love - this practical witness speaks louder than words alone to these staff. We continue also to attend Thai church with everyone and the non believing staff love to be there.



Finally, August in Thailand , is a time when mothers are thanked and honoured. It is one of the cultural days of Thailand we are keen to respect and provides the opportunity to thank our many mother figures here, with gifts and home made cards and posters, and with a special shared meal together. We made it, albeit a bit later than planned, and the staff came with their own children to share in a traditional Thai bar-b-que meal outside (with mosquito repellent, zappers and spray of course!). We take this time to show respect and honour to the women who lovingly care for children that are not their own, and often needing to do tasks that many others would be reluctant to do. Above all at this time we pray for each staff member and let them know how much God loves them and sees their heart of compassion.



Pray for the ongoing projects of SDSU, and for the wisdom of the staff to pace themselves well

Pray for the ongoing health concerns at Hope Home, but praise God for protection and healing

Praise God for His provision through opportunities to learn alongside other people, and to share His love in these time

I trust that you too, in these times, whatever seasonal changes are happening in your lives, are able to keep your heart and mind focused on our God and Saviour -the source of peace in troubled or hard times. He is faithful now and He always w be. Thank you for your amazing prayer support and encouragement, and also practical and financial support for BMS. We are partners together to share the Good News of Jesus. Thank you for the partnership



Dear Friends

This is to thank you for your thoughtful and prayerful engagement with our latest email and newsletter, and the info about unrest in Nepal. Today we want to provide a Nepal country and family update, as we enter the South Asian Dashain festival season.

Autumn country update

During the very recent newsletter we sought to inform about the unusual events which occurred in Nepal recently, events which were also covered by international media. Thank you for engaging with this info, for the messages to us via various platforms, and for your prayers and intercession for the country and for all Nepalis.

Following public unrest, 73 deaths, politician homes and government buildings in flames, ministers resigning (and in some cases being publicly assaulted), and the dissolving of parliament, the army is now in control and some normality is returning, as we are entering the Dashain festive season here.

We now have an interim prime minister, former Nepal Chief Justice Sushila Karki, who has become the first woman to lead the country. Elections are due in March, and we expect this to be quite tense, as old and new movements will tussle for power. The last week has been calm, as Nepali families prepare for Dashain, shop and travel. Like Christmas in the UK, this is the time when families come together, eat, meet, celebrate, and discuss family, local and national matters. This year there is a lot to process, a lot to discuss, maybe a lot to hope for...,whilst some families also mourn the recent loss of loved ones, or nurse the injured back to health

Autumn family plans

For quite a while now, maybe even for a year, we have been planning a unique family journey for this autumn school break. We had considered if and how we might contribute to the success of the 'anti human trafficking' work here, beyond my (Toby's) professional involvement, and arrived at the thought of a sponsored bike ride around the (demanding) Annapurna Circuit trekking route. For several months now, and in preparation for this, Toby, Jakey, and Ella have been working on their mountain-biking skills, and their stamina, together with six other interested cyclists. Pippa and Millie, together with some Nepali friends, planned the support vehicle journey, and logistics associated with a bike ride to an elevation of over 5400m (17,700 ft).

There was a high chance that the recent events in Nepal might have derailed these plans, but we currently feel that it is safe, and meaningful, to continue. We are now only one week away from commencing with the drive to the Annapurna mountain range and the bike ride, which will see us climb the height of Mt Everest over a ten day period of cycling, embracing the undulating terrain.

The tour will take two weeks to complete, and we are setting out on the 29th September. We better get in a couple more practice rides this week (attached a snapshot of how that often looks).

Every year, thousands of children fall victim to child sex trafficking in Nepal.

Tobias Vokuhl MCIOB is leading an ambitious project to build a safe home complex in the Kathmandu Valley where survivors can heal, resume their childhood and schooling, and safely prepare for a life of dignity and independence.

Tobias is determined to introduce sustainable building practices to Nepal, and has devised a way of using soil excavated on the site to make cement-stabilised earth blocks to build the complex's guardhouse.

It's a practice that he believes could reduce cost and waste more widely in the country.

To raise around £30,000 needed to hire local people to make the blocks, and to pay for training and equipment, Tobias and his two teenage children, Ella and Jacob, are cycling 220km around the Annapurna Circuit in the Himalayas at the end of September 2025, reaching more than 5,400m altitude.



DEACONS ELECTION



This is the time of the year when, as church members, we are reminded of our obligations regarding the diaconate of our church. Deacons are servants of Christ in the life and mission of this church and are called to share together in spiritual Leadership, pastoral care, administration and stewardship. Under the Charities act 1993, deacons are also Charity Trustees, responsible for the governance of the church. Deacons/trustees, are elected for a period of 3 years by church members.

With Mark's ministry ahead of us, we are at an exciting time as together we seek to discern the will of God at the beginning of this new chapter in His work here at Dagnall Street.

Our constitution allows for up to 12 deacons who shall be baptised believers and who have been in membership with DSBC for at least 2 years. There are currently 11 of us of whom three, Paula, Jan and Janet, complete their 3 year term this year. This leaves up to 4 vacancies.

It is the responsibility of church members to ensure that deacons are appointed to meet our obligations as a worshipping church. The job specification of deacon is simply that we use the gifts given to us by God and undertake our duties responsibly within those capabilities. As we approach the deacons' election may I remind you of the process:

"Nominations for deacons shall be in writing signed by 2


church members and shall be forwarded to the church secretary not later than 3 Sundays before the election.”

The election takes place at the church meeting after worship on **Sunday 16th November**, so nominations must be with me by Sunday 26th October. Announcements will be made on the 2 Sundays preceding the closing date for nominations, ie. 12th and 19th October.

“Voting is by secret ballot at the church meeting. Each candidate needs support from at least 50% of the members voting in order to be elected.”

Together, we need to consider this matter prayerfully as we seek God's will as to his call upon us. If you feel called to take on this role, or to encourage others, just ask me for a nomination form. If you are unable to attend the meeting, postal voting forms will be available from me after 26th October.

He gives us life anew**


**He deals with all our refuse

12 October: This week we pray for the South Wales Baptist Association, which exists to encourage the building and development of healthy churches and to enable them to assist each other in mission in their community, in Wales and in the world.

News from Churches Together in St Albans

St Albans Folk Music is publicising a show '**Grace will lead me home'**

It will be touring during October and it will be at St Saviour's Church on Sunday October 19th at 7.30pm. Tickets are available from <http://www.ticketsource.co.uk/stalbansfolkmusic>.

Grace Will Lead Me Home tells the story of two men whose lives followed astonishingly similar paths, but whose experiences were astoundingly different. Both were eleven when home-life ended. Both had sea-faring careers. Both found religion. And both became revered and influential celebrities in the campaign for the abolition of slavery.

One was a slave trader. The other was a slave. Today, one is remembered for a song. The other is almost completely forgotten. John Newton was the captain of a slave trading ship who saw the light and became a preacher. He wrote many hymns, including Amazing Grace, and later became a prominent abolitionist, mentoring William Wilberforce.

Olaudah Equiano was a kidnapped African, shipped to America and sold. He bought his freedom, came to London where he was a founder of the Sons of Africa abolition group, which brought him into the same influential circles as Newton, Wilberforce and other abolitionists.

To mark John Newton's 300th birthday, Angeline Morrison, Cohen Braithwaite-Kilcoyne, Jon Bickley and John Palmer explore his life, the inextricable link between his hymn Amazing Grace and the slave trade, its iconic status as a protest against oppression and its relevance to today's legacies of colonialism.

It's a show built around the songs from a critically acclaimed album. The live version of Grace Will Lead Me Home uses traditionally based and new songs, linked by 18th century diaries and writings from Newton, Wilberforce, Equiano and other contemporaries, to highlight all aspects of his life; how Amazing Grace became such an iconic statement of protest and what it means in the modern world.

Harpenden United Nations Association and Churches Together in Harpenden, invite you join them for their Annual Service for United Nations Day, at St Nicholas Church, Harpenden AL5 2TP, on Sunday, 26th October 2025, at 6.30pm (arrive 6:15 for 6:30). This year we commemorate the 80th Anniversary of the founding of the United Nations, 24th October 1945.

Our guest speaker will be Sir George Norton of the Royal College of Defense Studies on "The achievement of Peace in Europe." After the service, all are invited for light refreshments in Cornelia's Café.

At one time there were many United Nations Associations around the country, including St Albans, but there has been a gradual decline. Harpenden United Nations Association has been running since 1947, in place of the earlier League of Nations group. Do support this service, at a time when the need for peace and peacemakers is only too apparent.
